12	WHEREAS, in April 2016 world leaders recognized the urgent need to combat climate change by		
13	signing the Paris Agreement, agreeing to keep global warming "well below 2°C above pre-industrial levels" and		
15	to "pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5°C;" and		
16	to pulsue enoris to minit the temperature mercuse to 1.5 C, and		
17	WHEREAS, a 2018 United Nations special report projected that limiting warming to even the		
18	dangerous 1.5°C target this century will require an unprecedented transformation of every sector of the global		
19	economy by 2030, and the 2019 United Nations Emissions Gap Report found that global civilization must		
20	achieve zero carbon emissions by 2030 through deeper and faster emissions cuts than previously recommended;		
20 21	and		
22			
22	WHEREAS, the United States of America has disproportionately contributed to the climate and		
23	ecological emergencies and thus bears an extraordinary responsibility to rapidly solve these crises; and		
2 4 25	ecological emergencies and thus bears an extraordinary responsionity to rapidry solve these erises, and		
25 26	WHEREAS, anthropogenic climate change, pollution, environmental destruction, and fossil fuel		
20 27	extraction and use have and will continue to exacerbate systemic racial, regional, social, environmental, and		
28	economic crises (referred to in this resolution as "systemic crises") by disproportionately affecting indigenous,		
29	migrant, minority, deindustrialized, and depopulated rural communities, impoverished individuals, low-income		
30	workers, women, the elderly, the unhoused, people with disabilities, and the youth (referred to in this resolution		
31	as "frontline and vulnerable communities/persons"); and		
32			
33	WHEREAS, the nation is currently experiencing an emergency defined by climatic, ecological, and		
34	systemic crises (referred to in this resolution as "climate emergency") that are generating current and rapidly		
35	escalating harm; and		
36			
37	WHEREAS, the massive scope and scale of action necessary to stabilize the climate and biosphere		
38	will require unprecedented levels of public awareness, engagement, and deliberation to develop and implement		
39	effective, just, and equitable policies to address the climate emergency no later than 2030 and initiates an effort		
40	to safely draw down carbon from the atmosphere, ensuring a just transition for residents and accelerating		
41	adaptation and resilience strategies in preparation for intensifying local climate impacts; and		
42			
43	WHEREAS, a 'just transition' is prioritized. A 'just transition' includes:		

1 2 3	• Addressing past and ongoing harms by focusing on the principles of justice, inclusion, diversity, equity, and democracy during the transition to a zero-emissions, renewable energy economy, and thriving ecology;		
4 5	• Security of basic needs and job training for everyone as a guaranteed public good, to enable an easier transition to renewable energy and low-carbon jobs;		
6 7	• Expanding workers' rights and protections to prioritize their well-being amidst the effects of climate change on working conditions;		
8 9	• Democratic and participatory processes that enable communities to collectively plan, implement, administer, and benefit from transitional changes in their localities;		
10 11 12	• Ensure the prosperity and security of all residents in Leon County through a healthy economy and environment, allowing these communities to share in the benefits of the transition equally.		
12	WHEREAS, the warming climate poses a threat to Leon County's native marine and land habitats,		
13	leading to the rapid increase of invasive species. These invasive species have the potential to disrupt and alter		
15	ecosystems and natural processes; and		
16			
17	WHEREAS, Leon County recognizes that the full participation, inclusion, support, and leadership of		
18	community organizations, faith communities, youth, labor organizations, academic institutions, indigenous		
19	groups, and racial, gender, family, immigrant, and disability justice organizations and other allies are integral to		
20	the climate emergency response and mobilization efforts; and		
21			
22	WHEREAS, Leon County has committed to and worked towards further reducing greenhouse gas		
23	emissions from County operations by 30% by 2030; and		
24			
25 26	WHEREAS, Leon County's Integrated Sustainability Action Plan (ISAP) is a sustainability strategic		
26 27	plan to institutionalize sustainability action into operations, protocol, and policy, as well as promote sustainability in the community more broadly; and		
28	sustainability in the community more broadily, and		
20 29	WHEREAS, Leon County recognizes that the full participation, inclusion, support, and leadership of		
30	community organizations and citizens are integral to the climate emergency response and mobilization efforts,		
31	and as such Leon County's sustainability program is rooted in citizen and stakeholder engagement; and		
32			
33	WHEREAS, to provide a structure/framework for a regional climate compact Leon County led the		
34	creation and actively participates in the Capital Area Sustainability Compact.		
35			
36	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY		
37 38	COMMISSIONERS OF LEON COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:		
30 39	1. Leon County declares that a climate and ecological emergency threatens our county, city,		
40	region, state, nation, society, humanity, and the natural environment.		
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2. Leon County will work to ensure meaningful engagement of youth, providing routine and 1 2 ongoing opportunities to provide input regarding environmental factors integral to climate 3 change and give up-to-date scientific research in the efforts to aid in providing a solution with the most equitable outcome. Furthermore, citizens of all ages are invited to present in 4 5 any commission meeting that may proceed. 6 3. Leon County directs the County Administrator to work with the existing Sustainability Staff/Department to include greenhouse gas and co-pollutant impact statements, greenhouse 7 gas and co-pollutant reduction, and greenhouse gas drawdown statements on all relevant 8 agenda items before the County Commission. 9 10 11 4. Leon County will implement a native plant clause that addresses the hazards of invasive plant species. Furthermore, the implementation of the plant clause will promote county 12 partnerships with local plant nurseries to engage and educate the community in plant-related 13 events. The clause will include: 14 The importance of planting native plant species to preserve Tallahassee's 15 • biodiversity and food sustainability, as well as promote eco-tourism. 16 17 To further achieve these objectives, educational initiatives shall be established to • raise awareness among residents, landowners, businesses, and visitors about the 18 19 ecological benefits of the county's native plants and the detrimental impacts of invasive species. Additionally, resources shall be allocated to support community 20 21 engagement programs that promote the adoption of sustainable practices and native plant species in both urban and rural landscapes. 22 By enacting this clause, Leon County affirms its commitment to safeguarding the 23 region's native flora, supporting its diverse wildlife, and nurturing a thriving eco-24 tourism industry that highlights the county's natural beauty and ecological 25 26 significance for the benefit of current and future generations. 27 5. Leon County commits to furthering efforts to improve the water quality and safety while 28 29 minimizing the pollution and algal blooms of local water bodies, including but not limited 30 to Lake Munson. 31 6. Leon County commits to continuing to keep the concerns of frontline and vulnerable 32 communities central to all current and future sustainability and climate action planning 33 processes by inviting and encouraging such communities to actively participate in the 34 35 development and implementation of the Integrated Sustainability Action Plan and all climate mobilization efforts. 36 37

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1 2	7.	Leon County commits to openly support the local food justice movement and publicly owned community gardens to mitigate food scarcity and promote food security and
3		acknowledge the role that global warming plays in food access and production. These
4		gardens will be used in defense against food insecurity and food deserts within frontline and
5		vulnerable communities.
6		
7	8.	Leon County will communicate with the disabled community and those needing
8 9		accommodations to devise equitable and inclusive solutions to address the climate crisis which do not jeopardize the well-being of any of the groups of people stated herein.

11	9.	Leon County commits to collaborating with community partners to increase climate literacy
12).	and education in the community, including K-12 schools.
12		and education in the community, meruding K-12 schools.
13 14	10.	The County Commission must recognize and address the impacts of the climate emergency
15		and work to ensure prosperity and stability for all people in Leon County.
16		
17	11.	This resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption hereof.
